Shirley Clark was born in Pensacola, Florida to Irma and Emmanuel Powell on February 6, 1935. She was the third of four daughters.

The family moved to New York in 1940, settling in Harlem where Shirley attended public school and graduated New York Vocational High School. While attending High School she met Earl Clark who happened to live on the next block. They became friends and married on June 28, 1958. This 52 year marriage was a beacon of hope and encouragement for all who experienced it. Their favorite quote was: "Some people search a lifetime and never find the love they are looking for some people find them, but don't know until its too late. Only a few realize what they found and thank the Lord for the one true love of their life."

Shirley returned to school to train in the Montessori method of teaching and became a child care administrator. She devoted twenty years to the NYC Day Care system and retired in 1996. She had a genuine passion for children which was evidenced by the fact that many of the young people that passed through her centers became extended family. Children flocked to Shirley for her kindness, generosity and ability to make them feel understood.

Shirley's family joined Memorial Baptist Church in 1947 where she was baptized, attended Sunday school and worship service for many years under pastors W.W. Monroe, George Polk and Preston Washington. In later years, health issues prevented her from attending regular service however she was spiritually attended to and communed by her husband, Deacon Earl R. Clark of Memorial.
