

Ms. Grace B. Killen was born in Cape Palmas, Liberia to Rev. Martin Killen and Anna Russell Killen of St. Thomas Episcopal Church located in Monrovia, Liberia on September 9, 1930. She is the middle child out of five children. Their names are as follows (in order from oldest to youngest): Richard Killen, Mariah Killen, Grace Killen, Sarah Killen, and Samuel Killen. Grace migrated to the United States of America in 1980 where she lived until the Lord called her home on April 5, 2012 at Saint Barnabas Medical Center in Livingston, NJ.

Grace Killen was sent to live in Monrovia by her parents so that she may obtain a better life at a young age. While she may have had very little formal education as a young child, Grace obtained wisdom and possessed a good heart. She met and married Amos Cooper Sr., whom was the chief electrician of Power Authority in Monrovia, Liberia (currently known as L.E.C.) Grace loved Amos with her all and the two of them loved and raised their children to the **BEST** of their knowledge, yet with **ALL** of their **LOVE**. Grace became ill in the physical, but not in her spirit.
