**Clyde E. Cook** was born in Selma, Alabama to the late Ira and Lottie Cook. Clyde was the youngest of four children. At an early age his family relocated to Harlem New York and Clyde received his education in the New York City Public School System, graduating from Clinton High School in the Bronx.

During his adult years Clyde fell in love and married Clarissa Harrison and resided in the Village of Harlem until she preceded him in death in 2006.

Mr. Cook entered the Auxiliary Police in the 1970's and graduated with honors. His professional career consisted of several managerial positions, beginning with, Harlem Hospital, the City Municipal Building on Centre Street, the Elections Polls and ending with the position and title of President and Building Manager of HDCF 206 West 121 St., in which he helped many and performed outstanding and exemplary service. Mr. Cook's leadership ability led him in becoming an active community affairs and activities advocate. His diligent work to improve the Village of Harlem spearheaded his joining forces with the 28th Precinct.

With every available effort, the two forces combined and cleaned up a crime infested neighborhood. Being such a lover of community, Mr. Cook participated in and later became the President of the Golden Awards Committee. The organization under the leadership of Mr. Cook has honored many of Harlem's Elite Professionals for exceptional and devoted acts of service within the community.

Clyde was a proud member of the Harlem Village and because of his inspiration and positive outlook; he was an optimistic figure in the community. His smile and kindness moved everyone that knew him; he was a strong pillar and role model. Mr. Cook took great pride and pleasure in "Helping" others. He loved writing poetry, going to the movies and was a **FATHER FIGURE and DEAR FRIEND TO MANY**. His direct involvement as a Harlem Community advocate, initiated the enhancement and enrichment of a stable family neighborhood.
