Mrs. Jacqueline Gladstein sunrise began on December 1, 1945, in Magee, Mississippi. She departed from this world into eternity on October 17, 2013 in New York City, New York. She was the only daughter of the late Dello and Ruben Hayes. They affectionately named their baby girl, Willie Ruth Haves. She received her informative early and secondary educational training at Piney Woods School in Piney Woods, Mississippi, is one of the top ten boarding schools in the United States. As a child growing up in Mississippi, the passion of the Civil Rights Movement was very much engrained in her. She saw her mother participate in marches and they also resided on the same street as Civil Rights leader Medgar Evers, which was where he was assassinated by a Klu Klux Klan member. Her belief in self-improvement, education and fair treatment; led to her joining the Student Non-Violent Coordinating Committee (SNCC). As a member of the SNCC, she participated in cafeteria sit-ins and marches. Following graduation and working with the Civil Rights movement, she decided to move to New York City, NY. Upon arriving in New York City in 1967, the name Willie Ruth Hayes no longer fit her emerging New York persona and she officially became known as Jacqueline Ruth Hayes, all her friends fondly referred to her simply as "Jackie."

Shortly after arriving in New York City in 1968, Jackie met and married her first love Gideon Manasseh and out of that union came one daughter, Makeda Manasseh. Years later, she met and married Philip Gladstein of Queens, NY.

When Jackie first arrived in New York City, she lived on the lower east side and socialized within the artist social groups. If you ever talked with Jackie, you would hear her talk about those interactions and impacting emerging social times of the 60's and 70's. Her philosophy was that, "this world was not about black or white but about social economic empowerment." She was certainly a woman of her era. She loved to increase her knowledge through reading. She was a great teacher of life...she was a very outspoken person. She loved tennis, swimming, walking, music and socializing with friends and family. She loved the film and movie industry, and as such she participated as an actress extra in the movie Dog Day Afternoon, she also worked for Bill Cosby and several others in the Theatre of Arts industries and until her early retirement she worked at American Health Magazine.

Jackie's memories, life and future investment in this world will move forward through her only child Makeda Manasseh-Colston, son-in-law Patrick Colston, two granddaughters Gia Sarai Colston, Davina Faith Colston, and her former husband Gideon Manasseh; as well as long time friends and family, who reside in New York, Mississippi and California.
