During these trips she was always the one making sure that everyone was happy, that there was enough food, and that the experiences were full of laughter and joy.

She was a woman with a big heart, displayed her thoughts, good and bad. This made her a force. She had judgments and opinions about the world around her. Ultimately, you knew what you were getting with Big Auny, a woman, who was straight laced as well as hot tempered and compassionate. In having a big heart, she gave unconditionally, but also voiced out when she felt hurt. I admired this about her, her ability to call things as she saw it, but also be one of the first people to offer support when the need arose.

In trying to come to grips with losing her, these cherished memories of a vivacious personality, full of spice and compassion are what is helping me move onward. I think she would have asked of all of us to remember this, and not that she is gone.
