The Life of Barbara "Babby" Young

**Barbara Delores Young** was born on April 6, 1959 to the late Charles E. Young and Martha Young in New York City, NY. She was called home to her Heavenly Dwelling on October 10, 2014. She was the middle child, and only girl, born in between the late Charles "Chuckie" Young, Jr. and Jeffrey Curtis Young.

Barbara, or "Babby" as she was affectionately known, grew up in a religious household and attended Grace United Methodist Church her entire life. As a young adult, she attended Ophelia DeVore School of Charm and graduated from Norman Thomas High School in NYC. She also attended the Borough of Manhattan Community College.

Babby started her career at the New York City Department of Housing and in March 1990, entered the NYC Department of Corrections as a Corrections Officer. For the last few years she was stationed at the Manhattan Detention Complex. Babby formed a strong bond with her co-workers and work family. However, she was enthusiastically looking forward to her retirement within the next year.

Babby loved traveling the world and visited many countries including Russia, China, Turkey, Egypt, Japan, Paris, London, Switzerland, Germany and Amsterdam, as well as the Caribbean. Upon her death she was preparing for a trip to India. She also had a passion for cooking and baking, and would often host family gatherings. Barbara was known to family, friends and co-workers as a giver, and would give to all, as an expression of her love and devotion. She always brought back mementos from her travels abroad, which she shared with her family and friends.

Babby cherished her nieces and nephews, Justin, Shana and Delaney; and her two goddaughters, Ana-Leah Caba-Young and Paisley Elizabeth Jenkins. This past April, Babby celebrated a milestone 55th birthday along with her "twin Cousin" Adrienne Young. They considered themselves "twin cousins" since they were born on the same day, four hours apart. The birthday celebration included a girl's night out with twenty-five women who enjoyed mechanical bull riding, lots of fun and lots of laughs.

She was a devoted member of Grace United Methodist Church since her birth. She accepted the Lord Jesus Christ as her personal Savior under the leadership of Reverend Dr. Matthew Adams, Jr.

Barbara leaves to mourn: her mother, Martha; brother, Jeffrey; sister-in-law, Odette; four nieces and nephews, Justin, Shana, Delaney and Anna-Leah.
