On Saturday, October 25, 2014 at 1:15 p.m., God called Ruth to be one of His angels. She's the wind beneath our wings and promise in our hearts. Mother Knight was born to the late Joseph and Lucy Jones in Oxford, NC. She had five brothers, Joseph (Red) Jones, Alonzo (Fonzo) Jones of Oxford, NC and Yancy and Ernest Jones (Uncle Pete) of New Jersey. She also had three sisters, all of whom preceded her in death, Adel Green of North Carolina, Annie Lee Freeman of Newark, NJ and Josephine Rodger of New York.

Ruth was married to the late Frank McCormick and six children were born to this union. After being widowed, she married Prince Hawkins. She was widowed again and then married Deacon Varnis Knight. The two were married until his death in 2008. Pop was a great stepfather. He enjoyed cooking and gardening.

Deaconess Knight was a member of New Bethel Missionary Church located on Rankin Street in Newark, NJ under the leadership of the late Rev. C.E. Young, and her present, Pastor Rev. London Jones. She was a member of the church for over fifty-six years. She served as President of the Pastor's Aide, as a Missionary and Deaconess, and she was later named a Church Mother. Her favorite work in the church was as a Missionary. On every fifth Sunday, she would visit the sick in their homes, hospitals and nursing homes. Even in later years when she could no longer visit, she made phone calls and sent her daughters. She loved the fact that her two daughters were ministers.

Ruth also served her community as a member of her Neighborhood Block Association and she also worked with local politicians. She believed that everyone should vote and support their party.

Ruth was one of the first black women to start her own business in New Jersey. She later went to work for Chrill Home Care Services until she retired after twenty-seven years as a caregiver and companion.

Ruth was preceded in death by four of her children, Annie Ruth McCormick, Douglas McCormick, Charles (peewee) McCormick and Benjamin McCormick.
