Obituary

Joy Jean Solomon was brought into this world on Thursday, July 8, 1943, at Kinney Hospital in Newark, NJ to parents Helen J. Solomon and Eugene A. Solomon Jr., and sister LaVern Solomon.

Joy had a wonderful sense of humor and often was very sarcastic in conversations with friends and family. She was a very straight forward person and frequently spoke her mind about her feelings and opinions, but doing so in a loving and caring manner. She loved her family, friends, co-workers and the people of her community. If you were invited into Joy's house, you were treated like one of her own children, like a brother or a sister; to her, you were family.

Joy was a fighter, a strong and determined woman, who cared more about her children than herself. On Friday, December 5, 2014, Joy accepted her award for a life well lived and was called home by God. We find peace in knowing that she is eternally resting with the rest of her family that has gone home to the Lord, deceased mother and father, Helen and Eugene Solomon and daughter Tiffany N. Grove.
