Helen Louise Mayo Dudley passed away on December 24, 2014 at the age of 95. Born January 13, 1920 in Cumberland County, Virginia, she was the eldest of nine children. Her parents were the late Junious Warren and Victoria Flippen Warren.

Sister Dudley received her grammar school education in segregated Cumberland County. Since high schools in that county were provided for "whites" only, she left home at the age of fourteen and moved to Richmond, Virginia to work as a live-in domestic. Shortly after that, she relocated to Montclair, New Jersey.

Sister Dudley became a wife and mother at a very young age. A family friend, a young minister form back home had also moved to Montclair. They began dating, and soon she and the Reverend Randolph Mayo Sr. were married. Their union was blessed with three children, Ethel, Randolph Jr., And Helen Virginia. After a few years, the young family relocated to Newark, New Jersey.

Although a busy minister's wife and mother, Sister Dudley never abandoned her quest for knowledge. She read extensively and found time to enroll in night school, pursuing a variety of interest which eventually led to a High School Equivalence diploma. She further pursued her education at Essex County College.

In 1962, Sister Dudley married her second husband, Sam Dudley. He was deceased in 1987 after a long, debilitating illness. During those years, sister Dudley never wavered in her loving and devoted care of him, truly exemplifying the fruits of the Spirit: love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness, and self control (Gal 5:22-23).

Sister Dudley joined Philemon Baptist Church in the 1940's. She was a devout Christian who worked tirelessly in the ministries of her church and community. She was the president of the Missionary Society for 40 years, and during her presidency, programs were developed for feeding the hungry, clothing the homeless, and administering to the needs of the elderly and youth of the community. She was also the founder of the annual Women's day celebration, and was the adult Sunday School teacher for more than 15 years.

As a young woman her compassion for the needs of the broader community led her to volunteer her time to many causes. She worked with the Urban Leagues's outreach programs for the poor, the Red Cross, the March of Dimes, Essex County Tuberculosis League, and the Rent Control Administration. She also sold Easter Seals and worked with voter registration. She was the recipient of a citation from Washington commending her for her work. Sister Dudley was also an active member of the NAACP and an oficer in the PTA's of every school her children attended.

She was employed by Orbach's Department Store in Newark, New Jersey for many years. A trailblazer, she was the first employee of color hired to work in the Buyer's department, and on the floor as a sales clerk. She also was a columnist for the Newark Herald, an African American owned newspaper no longer in existence. All the social news of any importance could be found in her weekly column.

Sister Dudley lived a life of service to God, family, church, and community. She will be sorely missed and remembered for her soft-spoken, kind, and gentle manner. She personified dignity and elegance, a true lady.

In addition to her parents and her husbands, Sister Dudley was predeceased ny her grandson, Thomas Booker III, and her brothers, Aaron, Webster, Charles, and Arthur Warren.

She is survived by her devoted children, Ethel Mayo Booker, husband Thomas Jr., Abdul-Qawiyy Muhammad aka Randolph Mayo Jr., his fiancee Beverly Williams, Helen Virginia Mayo LaSure, husband Raymond; grandson, Rahman LaSure; great granddaughter, Ruby Mae LaSure; sisters, Phyllis Landis and Janie Jackson, husband Roland; brothers, Henry Warren, wife Thelma, and Raymond Warren, wife Dorothy, "adopted" daughter, Alphair Murph; and step-granddaughter, Carla Letbetter. She is also survived by nieces, nephews, cousins, friends and her beloved church family.
