She was quickly promoted at work to Management due to her superior intellectual skills, quick mind, intense drive and focus, and ability to multitask and juggle many assignments with ease and capability. Her colleagues at NDRI (National Research and Development Institute) were amazed by the huge workload Doris could handle with ease.

Doris was also an amazing supporter and helper of her family, friends, neighbors, community, church, as well as throughout Narcotics Anonymous. She gave thousands of dollars to help others with no thought of selfishness. She gave right out of her own fridge, freezer and pocket without a second thought. She helped to save friends and family members from eviction, lights out, and many other life emergencies and calamities, without ever asking for the same in return. She helped family members out of jail, assisted others to gain employment, took care of several friends and family members who were terminally ill with HIV in a loving and fearless manner, and never said no to a single request from her peers in Narcotics Anonymous, an organization which she loved with all her heart. At the time of her passing she was 27 years proudly clean and sober.

Doris leaves behind an entire community and extended family who will long mourn her passing. She was preceded in death by her mother, Lula Davis, father, Thomas Randolph, sister, Eleanor, and brothers, Richard and Joseph. She now transitions on to join them in peaceful eternity along with her niece, Victoria, and Victoria's youngest daughter, Sheryl.
