She said she took care of me as a child but that she would not take care of me as an adult, she told me to be a good girl, because she wasn't going to bail me out if I ever got arrested... all the good things in life. She taught me love, compassion, gratefulness, we talked about everything politics, religion, marriage, drugs, racism, injustice, She was small in stature but she had the confidence of a Christian, the confidence that she was and is a child of the Most High God and I did not know her to hold her tongue nor accept injustice from anyone. She is and was a virtuous woman, and that's what she wanted for her daughters, and for her grandchildren and great-grandchildren. She had so much love to give and she loved us all so much!
