### ELLA M. RHINES LIVINGSTONE-STURRUP February 27, 1918 – March 12, 2016

Ella M. Rhines Livingstone-Sturrup was born in Turner County, Georgia to William Rhines and Ethel L. Kendrick on February 27, 1918. An only child, Ella's mother died when she was very young. Ella was then raised by her Grandmother Etta Rhines, where she continued her education and learned essential textile skills.

As a young woman, **Ella** moved to Miami, Florida where she gained employment as a seamstress. Deeply religious, **Ella** became a member of the Greater Israel Bethel Baptist Church.

**Ella** moved to Newark, New Jersey in the 1950's and worked in the Garment Industry until her retirement. **Ella** became a member of the New Salem Baptist Church and served as active member of the Pastor Aid Committee.

When **Ella's** beloved niece Lillian moved to Newark, she assisted her in becoming acclimated with the city. Lillian's mother Lula D. and Ella were the best of friends and it was a joy to **Ella** to be reunited with her family. Ella lived for periods of time with Lula D. and Lillian and even assisted Lillian in running the family owned restaurant "Celeb".

Concerned about the development of opportunities for young people in Newark, **Ella** co-founded the International Youth Organization (IYO) with Carolyn and James Wallace in 1970. For 45 years IYO has provided vital services to thousands of youth and their family members. Such notable initiatives are the IYO Crime Prevention Through Job Creation Component, and the Youth Leadership Development & Family Preservation Component.

A member of the Eastern Stars, **Ella** held the following positions: Matron of Martha Chapter #6 Order of the Eastern Star; Grand Conductress Martha O.E.S.; Grand Royal Matron of the Queen Ester Grand Court of Amaranth of the Royal Court and Exalted for the State of New Jersey; and Queen for the City of Newark, New Jersey.

Community and Civic Minded, **Ella** was involved with many election campaigns. She worked on the campaign of Kenneth Gibson, the 1<sup>st</sup> African American Mayor of Newark, NJ. **Ella** also

worked on the mayoral campaigns for Sharpe James, Corey Booker and Ras Baraka. **Ella** was known by Newark's City Council Members, and was very proud of her working relationship with City Council Member Mildred C. Crump.

Ella made numerous lasting friendships while living in Florida. One such friendship was with Edwin Sturrup; a friendship which spanned the decades and distance of time and space, and led to their marriage on Valentine's Day 1999. Ella was 80 years old at the time of their marriage. Everyone loved Uncle Ed, but he became stricken a few years after their marriage and passed. Ella cherished their love and time together and that love was a source of inspiration in the years that followed.

Ella was an active member at her Grace Manor Senior home, and for years distributed newspapers to her fellow residents. Ella loved to travel and enjoyed yearly bus trips to Canada, visiting Niagara Falls, Ontario and Montreal. She would periodically visit Connecticut and returned home to Florida to visit old friends and family.

Ella also loved to cook and everyone admired her cooking. She was famous for her potato salad, cabbage, sweet potato pies and cakes. In addition, Ella loved visiting her family in Washington, DC. Her beloved niece Lillian, nephews Marion and Rollie would often travel to Newark to bring her to Washington DC for Memorial Day, Thanksgiving and Christmas holiday celebrations. Often Ella's sister-friend Elsie would come as well.

A memorable occasion for **Ella** was her 95<sup>th</sup> Birthday Celebration. It was a well kept surprise and Ella had no idea that so many family and friends from out of town had come to celebrate this most historic day with her along with her community family and friends.

On February 27, 2016, **Ella** celebrated her 98<sup>th</sup> birthday with her beloved nephew Rollie who took her to one of her favorite restaurants' Red Lobster where they had a sumptuous meal. **Ella** lived a full life, and was loved and respected by so many. **Ella** passed peacefully at home on March 12<sup>th</sup>.

Ella leaves to mourn her passing, son Lorenzo Cobb (Ellen) and Godson Charles Andrews, Sister-in-law Gloria Toliver, Brother-in-law Harold Sturrup (Roberta), Goddaughters Edie Watson, Gwen Marshall, Carolyn Wallace, Mildred Crump, Ruby White, beloved niece Lillian Hill (Marion), special sister-friend Elsie Jackson, and a host of loving nieces, nephews, cousins, godchildren and other family and friends.
