On the morning of Thursday, September 29, 2016, the sun set on **Escoe Webster Branner**. He transitioned to the Land of Love peacefully after a near century of dedicated service to God and family in New York City.

Born June 16, 1918 in White Pine, Tennessee, he was the fourth of ten children to parents, Warren and Mary Branner. He was raised on a farm, where he learned the value of hard work, perseverance and respect. He enlisted in the US Armed Forces in March 1941. During his tenure as a Staff Sargent, he served in New Guinea, the Philippines and Australia. Due to an injury, he returned to the states in 1944 and received an honorable discharge in October 1945. He valued education and made a point of earning his GED.

While attending Salem Church of White Pine, he met the love of his life, Ms. Edith Mae Evans (Branner). They were married in April 1946 and subsequently relocated to New York City where he was employed with the United States Postal Service. His career as a postal worker spanned 34 years; a job he loved and retired from in 1980.

His marriage to Edith Evans, among other blessings, produced four loving children, Jerry, Patricia, Beverly and Paul. Sadly, Edith made her transition in December 1972. After her passing, he thought the world would end and that God had left him. However with prayer, he realized that God had a plan for his life. Upon returning home from Edith's funeral in Tennessee, he didn't think that the family would celebrate Christmas that year. Yet when he awoke the next morning, he was so happy that his children had put up a tree and decorated the house. "That was one of the best days of my life!" he said each time he shared the story.

As the patriarch of his family, Dad's proudest accomplishment was fulfilling his role as a supportive father. He was a doting grandfather and great-grandfather and was affectionately referred to as "Papa". He was always open to conversations and offering his perspective about life and the importance of doing what you are called to do. In the fall of 1973, Dad met Eva Williams who later became his longtime friend and companion. He embraced her family as his and she was a loving mother figure to us as well. Dad worked diligently with the Washington Houses Tenant's Association for over 20 years. During his tenure he was highly respected as a supervisor and trained others with techniques to maintain a safe community. He believed that everyone deserved safe and decent housing. Throughout his service he was presented with numerous awards honoring his dedicated service to the Washington Housing community.

Dad was a long-standing member of Mount Olivet Baptist Church where he loved the Sunday Service and Wednesday Noonday Prayer. He generally started his day with a copy of the New York Daily News and was a die-hard NY Mets fan. He was often seen wearing a cap that displayed the title Proud US-World War II Veteran in remembrance of his service.
