

Russell Bradley was born in Portsmouth, Virginia to the proud parents, Thomas and Martha Bradley on May 6, 1926. He was the oldest of four brothers.

Russell moved to New York at the height of the depression and settled in the village of Harlem. He attended Benjamin Franklin High School. After graduation, he entered the Army where he received an honorable discharge. After returning home from the Armed Forces, he became employed as a radio technician and remained in that position until he retired in 1978.

On September 12, 1953, he married Emily Weston. They remained happily married for fifty-five years. Russell was a devoted son. He gave every measure of care to his mother until her passing. He was passionately committed to his family. Although he never had children of his

own, he was a favorite uncle to all of his nieces and nephews. He bestowed on them the importance of always putting "family first."

Russell was very active in his community. He served as the President of the Ralph J. Rangel Houses Tenants Association for several years. He was an active member of the Tioga Democratic Club. He also served on the Board of Elections for many years. He enjoyed the role of "floor captain", in his building, and he took his responsibilities very seriously.

Russell was a true "people person". He loved being around people and having a good time. His three favorite things to do were to go fishing, play cards and to dance. You could always count on him to be "first" on the dance floor.

Russell enjoyed each day life offered and touched our lives in many ways. On Wednesday, November 9, 2016, God called for Russell. He leaves to celebrate his life and cherish his memory: a brother, Benjamin Bradley; a sister-in-law; many nieces and nephews; and a host of other relatives and friends.
