LUCILLE DELO AGARD was born on November 1, 1949. She was the daughter of the late Alicia Agard and Percy Walcott. Lucille was born in the Parish of St. James, Barbados, West Indies.

Lucy, as we called her, passed away at Calvary Hospital on Friday, June 14, 2019. She left behind her loving son Erskine, her siblings Geoffrey Agard and Lee Agard, sister-in-law Sandra Agard, niece Alicia Agard and late brother Andrew Sandiford (eldest), cousins Mary Best and Levere Thompson, as well as half brothers and sisters on her father's side, Yvonne Clarke, Sheila Walcott, Michael Walcott and Peter Birch, and a host of others.

Lucy grew up in Barbados where she attended St. Albans Primary school and later attended St. James Secondary School and Roach Technical School, where she learned typing and stenography. There, she met David Small and together they had a son (Erskine) whom they cared for and loved dearly. Lucy was a devoted member of the Caribbean Evangelistic Fellowship church and she was baptized in water in 1976 and was also baptized in the Holy Spirit in Jesus' Name in Barbados.

Lucy and her son Erskine moved to New York City in 1978 to join her mother (Alicia) and her brothers (Geoffrey and Lee). Lucy then attended the Harlem Pentecostal Assembly church with her mother. She worked as a housekeeper until the mid-90's when she was diagnosed with poor circulation in her legs and feet; and as a result, was placed on disability leave. Her cousins Diana, Mary, Pam, Cathy, and Thaddeus (whom she grew up with in Barbados) later joined her in NYC. During the late 80's, Lucy was diagnosed with diabetes, suffered amputation of all of her toes on one foot, and later suffered a heart attack in 1999. However, through all of her intense pain and suffering, she never complained or asked God "why me?" Instead, through her tears, she kept praising God! She was a great cook, and an extremely generous person. If she took a particular liking to you, she would withhold nothing from you.

Lucy joined Morning Star Full Gospel Assembly in 2000, then under the leadership of Bishop Charles H. Harris, Sr., where she attended services as faithfully as she could until her transition. In 2008, Lucy and her son moved to Middletown, NY to escape the stresses of city life. There, she loved to work in her gardens. When Lucy's condition began to deteriorate, she told her younger brother Lee "whatever happens I will accept it." It appears that she knew that God was calling her home. Anyone who knew Lucy would always see a smile on her face. She would jokingly tell the story about her younger brother who would refuse to eat his dinner, but just when someone else ate it, he would charge them for it. Lucy would tell that story and put a smile on your face. That is how we will remember her, as a cheerful, loving person who believed the Lord with her whole heart, and who was an excellent mother to her son.
