<u>Obituary</u>

This was not my Home; I was only passing through. I have fought the good fight, I have finished my course, I have kept the faith. 2 Timothy 4:7

Lorraine was the second child born to late Dorothy McIntyre Cauley and Calway Joseph Cauley in Jersey City, NJ. She spent much of her youth in Harlem, New York at the side of her legendary Grandmother, Lillie Bell McIntyre. Her grandmother's five-story walkup apartment with its many windows, allowed Lorraine to view her world and to form an ideology of service that would last a lifetime. She enjoyed laughter, as many of her life-long friends can testify. However, she was tough and no nonsense when it came to advocating for the safety and education of all children.

Lorraine's early education was provided by the Jersey City school system. Her desire to become a teacher developed from her love of psychology and her passion for Early Childhood Education was launched.

Lorraine left New Jersey and enrolled into Fayetteville State Teachers College in North Carolina. During this period, she married Jacob "Jake" Cuthbert Jr. and they were blessed with Cedric.

Lorraine being her usual feisty self, after a couple years, transferred to North Carolina Central College in Durham, North Carolina. Aside from Virginia Union visits to see Jake, visits to Rocky Point to see Cedric, she participated in protests for the right to vote and voter registration campaigns as the fight for desegregation gained greater momentum.

Lorraine C. Johnson was initiated into Delta Sigma Theta Sorority, Inc. at North Carolina Central College Alpha Lambda Chapter. After college she became affiliated with the North Jersey Alumnae Chapter which serves Essex, Hudson, and Union counties. Over the years, she was an advisor to the Delta Teens, member of the Scholarship Committee, Chair of the Finance Committee, as well as participating with numerous other committees. Lorraine enjoyed attending Regional Conferences and National Conventions, particularly the 75th in San Francisco and 100th in Washington D.C. Lorraine was a charter member of North Jersey Minerva Corporation, a 501© 3 not for profit public charity founded in 2000. She served as a member of the Board of Directors and chaired the Membership Committee. One of her great joys was fund raising and participating in the annual Scholarship Benefit Luncheon co- sponsored with the North Jersey Alumnae Chapter of Delta Sigma Theta Sorority, Inc. She stayed faithful to the cause until her health began to fail.

Lorraine's experience after college as a parks and recreation worker in Harlem helped define her "we learn through play" philosophy. In addition, as she began work in Jersey City's Head Start programs, she appreciated the flavor of the communities in which she worked daily. Resources were always needed for her children and their families. Lorraine saw past the circumstances of poverty and recognized the need for total family involvement. Parents were nurtured, older siblings encouraged, and loving care was being freely passed out with the same frequency as the tiny little milk containers. Entire developments were changed, families were changed, staff members were changed, all because of the serious spirit of "Mrs. Cuthbert".

Lorraine acknowledged she needed more education to affect true policy changes. From Bank Street College of Education at Columbia in New York to UCLA's School of Management and Leadership in California, she never stopped acquiring knowledge. She attended Kean University and studied Early Childhood/Leadership. There was also dynamic travel afforded to her in her professional capacity such as 'Leave No Child Behind' under Dr. Marian Wright Edelman, and a child advocate to monthly gatherings in Trenton, New Jersey to 'set Governors straight' as to understanding the best interest of inner-city children. Upon every opportunity she stopped to ask students what they were working on today, sit and observe, or just teach an old favorite and familiar song!

Lorraine married Charles Johnson and they were blessed with Charnette.

As a lifelong charter member of Mount Pisgah AME Church, she served on many ministries - the Gospel Choir, Scholarship Committee, Chairperson of the Women's Day Committee, Missionary Society, and a member of the Church Anniversary Celebration Committee, just to name a few. Lorraine made a joyful noise unto the Lord, always with humor and a love for familiar church traditions.

Lorraine truly loved her church and church family and could be depended upon in all aspects of service until her failing health prevented her attendance and participation.

Everyone gave her pleasure, joy and a reason to be excited about life. So many may have been helped by Lorraine's indefatigable spirit, yet it could have been only God working through her...even until the end.

She is preceded in death by her grandson, the late Benjiman David Walls.
