Obituary

Elijah William Feurtado was born on April 19,1939 to Leticia Cohen & Septimus Feurtado in Clarendon, Jamaica W.I. As a child he grew up on a farm and this is where his love of horses began. He then went on to become a jockey and a farmer of sugar cane.

In 1960 he met the love of his life, Carmen Bailey. He use to see her as she passed his family shop on her way to school everyday. He would profess his love telling her, "I am going to marry you one day".

At the age of 19 Elijah relocated to Florida via a work visa to do farmwork for three years. They kept a long distance relationship during this time. In his travels back and forth Elijah would bring oranges and sugarcane to woo her. He was extremely handsome and a definite charmer. Carmen loved the way Elijah danced especially to rocksteady, calypso and "ska" music". In addition, he was an exceptional cook. He knew how to get to Carmen's heart. After 3 years of courtship they were married on June 4,1965.

In 1967, Carmen migrated to New York City and had to leave her husband behind. Upon her arrival she quickly filed paperwork for her husband and he arrived in the Big Apple in 1968. They were excited about starting their new lives together. A year later they were expecting their first child, a son, eleven months later in 1970, a daughter, their third child in 1973 and their youngest in 1981.

Elijah and Carmen became active members of St. Georges Episcopal Church in 1968. Years later he became the designated Church driver where he transported children and the senior citizen population.

In the early 80's he started his own transit van line service, aka, "the dollar van". He helped change the game by pushing legislation for it to become legal. This is why he was affectionately named, The Godfather. From his entrepreneurial and hustler spirit he was able to acquire three Brownstones in Brooklyn.

Mr. and Mrs. Feurtado traveled extensively visiting places as far as the Holy Land, Europe, Alaska, and Canada. His favorite trip was when he visited the Middle East and dipped his head in the crystal waters of the River Jordan.

Unfortunately, he was the last living sibling from the Feurtado Tribe. He was called home to his final resting place on Friday, January 17, 2020.
