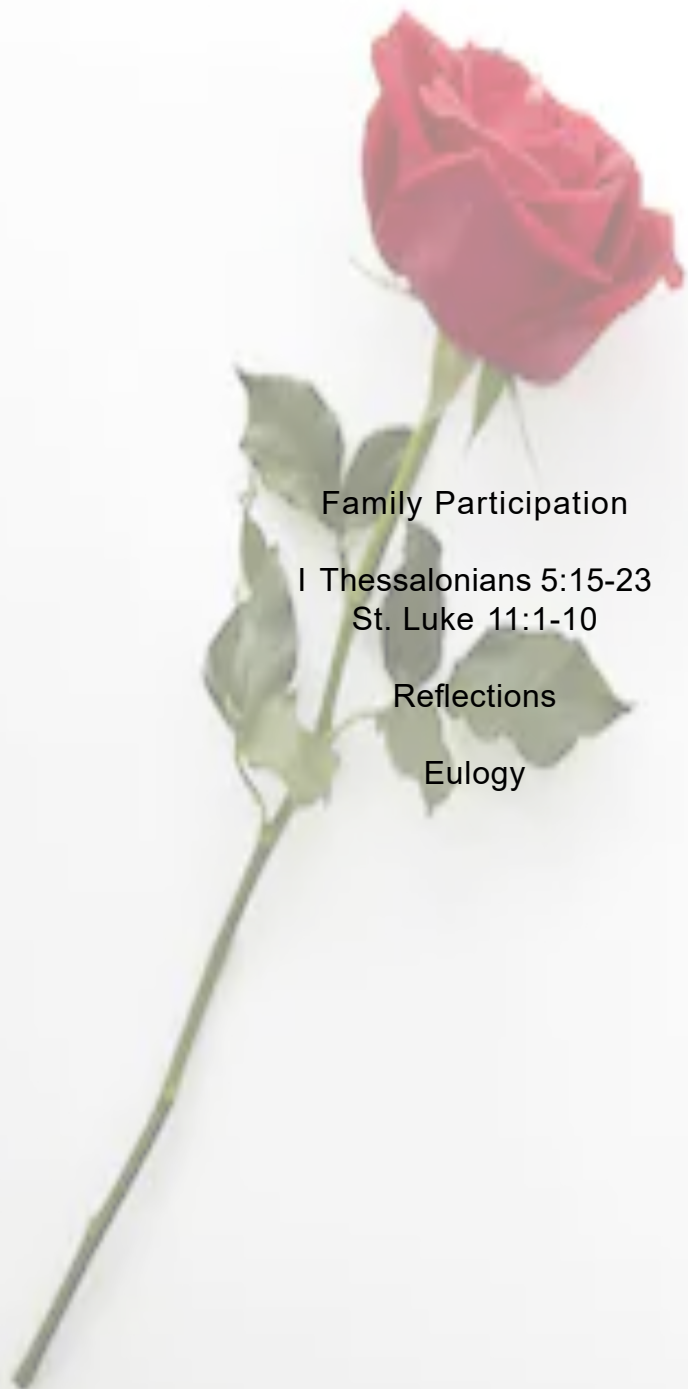

Eulogy

Elizabeth Bradley was born on April 13, 1937. She was the fourth daughter of seven children born to the late Jerry McPhaul and Fannie Ann Farmer-McPhaul. Elizabeth spent her early childhood in Scotland County, NC where she attended the public school. After the death of their mother in 1957, the family relocated to Greensboro, NC where Elizabeth only briefly remained. In early 1958 she moved to Brooklyn, NY. She rented a room from a nice woman called Alberta Greene. It was there that Elizabeth met Bill and Mary who quickly fell in love with her and adopted her as their god-daughter. Elizabeth met and married Ernest Bradley in the early part of 1961. After Bill's death, Mary and Elizabeth were inseparable as mother and daughter.

Elizabeth accepted the Lord as her savior at an early age at St. Jame's Holiness Church, and after moving to Brooklyn she became a devoted member of the Catholic faith at St. John's Parish.

Elizabeth worked for a manufacturing company on Mulberry Street in Manhattan until it closed. Elizabeth then sought employment through the New York Police Department and Department of Education as a school crossing guard where she remained until her retirement.
