<u>Obituary</u>

Lorraine Barbara "Chioma" Delany (nee Trim) was born in Henrietta Village on the Essequibo Coast of British Guiana, South America, on May 25, 1925. Lorraine is the eldest daughter of Thomas Woodland Trim and Johanna Letitia Trim. Her father Woodland was a shoemaker and the village chairman and her mother Johanna was a housewife who also supervised two government guest houses. Lorraine was raised by her two Aunts, Angelina Trim and Elydia Hoshing. In the Trim household, advanced learning and higher education were expected and achieved.

Lorraine began her teaching career at the early age of 16 years as a pupil teacher at the Ana Regina Government School on the Essequibo Coast. In the village, Lorraine was fondly called "Teacher Lorraine" or "Teacher Baby." Lorraine was well-known and respected in the county of Essequibo because she did a lot of charitable and advocacy work with youths and seniors. Lorraine formed a chapter of the Girl Guides which was instrumental for training young women in etiquette, home economics, education, and empowerment. In 1948, Lorraine graduated from Government Training College (GTC) as a First Class Trained Teacher. After graduation, Lorraine was appointed to a Methodist school in San Souci, Wakenaam Island, where she worked for several years.

Under the tutelage of Dr. Claude Denbow, Lorraine continued her activism and advocacy for the indigenous people in Georgetown, as an ardent Executive Member of the League of Colored Peoples (LCP); a British civil-rights organization whose primary focus was for racial equality around the world. Lorraine was a principal figure in the establishment of a chapter of the LCP in Henrietta Village.

Lorraine was instrumental in bringing Eze Ogueri, an African Prince from Nigeria, to Essequibo and other areas in the country. He gave her the name "Chioma," which in the Igbo language means "Gift from God," for her efforts. Lorraine contributed to two chapters in the book Seven Amazing Days, which detailed Mr. Ogueri's unforgettable mission to British Guiana. As a result of her high academic levels and community service, Lorraine was awarded a full academic scholarship, by the League of Colored Peoples, which allowed her to travel to the United States in order to further her education.

Lorraine arrived in the U.S on February 6, 1952 and resided in Harlem, NYC. Lorraine attended Queens College earning her Bachelor's Degree in Education and she obtained her Masters Degree in Sociology from Columbia University's Teachers Training College, in New York City.

In 1959, Lorraine met her future husband, Lucius L. Delany Sr., a very handsome, dashing, and charismatic lawyer who served as General Counsel for the Ethiopian Orthodox Church in the Bronx, NY. Lorraine and Lucius were both very involved in the Coptic Church and in the community. Their union produced four children: Henry B. Delany V, Lucius L. Delany, Jr., Sarah E. Delany, and Nan J. Delany.

In 1969, after her husband Lucius passed away, with four young children to raise, Lorraine returned to teaching within the New York City school system where she taught in the South Bronx, at P.S. 6 and continued teaching at CS 47x until her retirement in 1992. Always striving to better herself, Lorraine also went back to school where she earned her second Masters Degree in Education from the City University of New York. Lorraine participated in and helped implement several pilot programs in her schools: Follow-through Program, the Latchkey After-school Program, and the Summer Feeding Program. Throughout Lorraine's teaching career, in the country of her birth, and her adopted country, Lorraine continued to make an impact on and a difference in the lives of her children, in the children she taught, in the people she worked with, and on anyone that crossed her path. If Lorraine were here today, she would tell everyone to "Keep Climbing Jacob's Ladder!"

Lorraine Delany was predeceased by her loving husband Lucius L. Delany Sr., and sons Henry B. Delany and Lucius L. Delany Jr. Lorraine leaves to celebrate and remember her life sisters, Lucille E. Cadogan, Ursula Veronica ("Olive") Henry (recently deceased), Nancy R. Cummings, and Mennen Z. Pieters; daughters, Sarah E. Delany and Nan J. Delany; Grandchildren, Jelani M. Delany Anthony, Bryan L. Delany, and Breanna L. Delany; a host of nieces, nephews, great nieces and grand nephews, and a host of other relatives and friends throughout the United States, Canada, and Guyana, South America. Lorraine will Always Be In Our Hearts and to honor you we will continue to Climb Jacob's Ladder!


"God Called Your Name So Softly
