Annette Moses was born on June 7, 1940 in Chester, South Carolina to George McCluney, Sr. and Mae Alice Cole McCluney. As a child she spent her formative years in the fields helping her grandfather, Isaac Cole and her grandmother, affectionately known as "Mama" on the family's farm. Fondly she spoke about her idyllic childhood and how she and her loved ones raised chickens, hogs, cows and grew fresh greens, okra, picked berries and canned fruits. Tearfully, she would speak of her oldest sister, Helen, who passed when Annette was 3, but whom she never forgot. Upon the death of Mama, at the age of 16, Annette moved to New York, New York to be with her parents. In New York, she majored in secretarial skills and she spoke longingly of how her dad, lovingly known as "Poppy" one day, with a brand new typewriter, walked in the house and said, "I bought you a typewriter...I want my baby girl to learn how to type." She earned her High School Diploma from New York City's Department of Education. She was a striking, beautiful teenager and because of her model-like appearance, at age 16, she landed a job at Fifth Avenue's glamorous store, Tiffany's.

While living in the South, she met a "beau," Eugene Moses. He was so smitten by her that he followed her to New York and in holy matrimony, they married. It was a wedding that lasted 50 years, until in 2015 God called her husband home. With two girls they were blessed, Sherry was her first child and Karen, her baby girl. Oh, how she loved her "babies." While working for The Development Corporation of Israel, on her lunch hour, she shopped at Mays Department Store...so that she could bring home fancy dresses, socks and sweaters. For her children, she would host lavish parties. She would invite all of the children on Taft's 16th floor. In 1969, she made what she considered to be the most important decision in her life...she became a life-long servant of Jehovah! She made the life-altering decision to become a Jehovah's Witness. She was a fierce defender of the Kingdom, The Truth and the organization. She was a member of the Foster Congregation where she was a regular "householder," field service member, auxiliary pioneer and a full-time pioneer. She loved Jehovah. Her service to God spanned 50 years. She participated in the organization's activities and she traveled to Canada, Russia, Turkey, Greece and Germany.

From 1969 to 1975, she worked for a German business owner and his Italian wife, named The Burtoners. As an after-work project, for the couple and for their annual banquet, she would sew purple, velvet ribbons. About her spending time with her children, they became unhappy. She quit! As a school aide, she worked at I.S. 29 and in 1976, she joined the team at Mount Sinai Hospital Systems and became an Administrative Secretary. Her contribution to the health care system was to serve in KCC Nursing, Quality Control, Renal Dialysis and Reproductive Care. Her patients were special to her and they loved her. At events, she would bring home gift bags that the patients and staffhad given her. By attending Katherine Gibbs Business School, she advanced her professional skills. After 18 years of service, she retired from Mount Sinai.
