<u>Obituary</u>

George Everett Colley was born December 25, 1927, in Ludowici, Georgia; to James Colley and Rubye Colley Baker. George attended school in Ludowici, before moving to Summit, New Jersey to live with family.

George graduated from Summit High School in 1947 and entered the United States Army in October of 1950. Following Basic Training and Infantry School at Fort Campbell in Kentucky, P.F.C Colley was assigned to the 23rd Infantry Regiment, in the 2nd Infantry Division, with duty in the Republic of Korea. According to 2nd Infantry reports from January 1952, P.F.C Colley's unit was one of four regiments designated to defend the Missouri Line in the area known as the "Iron Triangle." These units faced extreme cold weather and heavy barrages of enemy fire, while conducting "extensive and aggressive patrolling" against determined North Korean forces. The report goes on to list 1,605 'negro personnel' were assigned to the division during this time, with P.F.C Colley being one of 118 soldiers awarded the Bronze Star Medal for Heroic Achievement in a Combat Zone. On January 2, 1952, P.F.C Colley received the prestigious Purple Heart Medal, for wounds sustained due to artillery attack. P.F.C Colley's awards also include the Korean Service Medal, the United Nations Medal, the Army Service Ribbon, the Good Conduct Ribbon, and the Combat Infantry Badge.

After his service in the United States Army, George earned a B.S. in Business Administration and began a career as a Civil Service employee until his retirement. He enjoyed the fellowship of friends and acquaintances in the New Jersey area, especially at Parkwood Diner in Maplewood, New Jersey where he often "held court".

George is preceded in death by both his loving wife Jeanette and parents, as well as the following siblings: Mary C. Nevels, Thomas Colley, Edythe C. Bynum, Arthur Colley, Ruth C. Byrd, Walter Colley, Samuel Colley, Jimmie C. Randel, and infant Adolph Colley.

Left to cherish his memories are his siblings Herbert Colley and Juanita B. Neal (Richard), along with numerous nieces and nephews including Rene King, Jimmy Colley, Brig Gen. Reginald Neal, Dr. Regina N. Streetman, Father Harry Nevels, Dr. Harold Nevels, Thomas Nevels, Gloria B. Smith, Sandra B. Hawes, Karen Colley, Walter Colley Jr., Saundra Clark, and Rev. Theodore Calhoun; along with his caregiver Mrs. Fernandez, longtime friend Debra Darrisaw-Howell, and the many patrons of Parkwood Diner and a host of other relatives and friends.
