After graduating from Wilson High School in 1956, Emma relocated to New York City, where she worked a series of odd jobs before obtaining her real estate license. By the late '60s, Emma mothered a son with David Silvia, Sr. During the late '70s, Emma married John Lawrence Feaster and furthered her education. She obtained an Associate in Science Degree from Bronx Community College in 1980. Shortly after, Emma started her career at The New York City Department of Sanitation. For nearly 20 years, Emma worked as a sanitation police officer before retiring early due to health issues.

Emma was a member of the Mount Morris Ascension Presbyterian Church for over three decades, where she served faithfully. She was always willing to help out for different church functions by baking cakes or making special dishes. She was also a member of the Usher Board and served as an Elder.

Throughout her life, Emma enjoyed cooking, gardening and traveling, especially via cruises. She visited countries across the world from Egypt to Trinidad.

Emma is preceded in death by her husband, John Lawrence Feaster; her sister, Willie-Mae Jackson; brother, William Ellis, Jr.; and longtime companion, Christopher Thomas. Emma is survived by her brother, Franklin Ellis (Diana); son, David Silvia, Jr.; grandsons, Já Quan Silvia and Jeremy Lambert; great-granddaughter, Janaisia Silvia; godchildren, Shelby and Stephen Boamah; and a host of nieces, nephews, cousins, and friends.
