<u>Obituary</u>

James Augustus Edey was born on October 20, 1942 in the Bronx, New York. He was born alongside his twin brother, Eugene Edey, Jr. who preceded him in death, to Sylvia Farrelly and Eugene Edey, Sr. James was the smaller of the twins, and thus inherited the nickname "Tiny". James and his family moved from the Bronx to the newly built Colonial Projects in Harlem in the early 50's. He served as an altar boy at Church of the Resurrection (Chapel of the Resurrection) and attended George Washington High School. After graduation, he worked at the NYC Police Department as one of its first Administrative Aides. He would later become a senior Administrative Aide. Tiny married Yvette Jacobs-El in 1969 and the union bore their daughter, Tene Yasmin Edey.

During his time at the Police Department, James joined the clerical union, Local 1549 of DC37, a division of the American Federation of State, County and Municipal Employees (AFSCME). In 1978, Tiny became a grievance representative and helped to save a lot of clerical jobs in the Department. Over the years he would rise to the rank of First Executive Vice President.

At work, James was affectionately known as "Jimmy" and was known for staunch advocacy, extensive knowledge, and his patient and friendly nature. Tiny always went above and beyond for his family and friends. Tiny was an avid football fan and he was a meticulous dresser and a social butterfly. Tiny attended Camp Minisink where he became a member of the Order of the Feather and the Tapawingo Honors Society. It is no surprise that throughout his life he belonged to a number of Social Clubs such as the Selective Colleagues, The Associates and the Casualeers. He was a good listener and loved to give advice and help others. He was loved deeply by all those who knew him. He is survived by his wife, Yvette Edey; daughter, Tene Yasmin Edey; grandson, Tenard Sheppard; goddaughters, Nicole Jardine and Ayanna S. F. Cunningham; sisters, Claudette Davis Schrader and Lorma Davis Varlack; and a host of nieces, nephews, grand nieces, grand nephews, cousins and friends. He is preceded in death by his brother, Samuel Davis, Jr.

Our James, our Jimmy, our Tiny will be missed more than words can say. He like his favorite team, was a GIANT of a man, husband, father, grandfather, uncle, cousin and friend.
