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Leola Gertrude Turner Scott was born one of two children to the late Madeline Taylor and Claude Turner, on March 14, in Roselle, New Jersey.

Upon her mother's death in 1937, she relocated to Burkeville, Virginia, to be raised by her maternal grandparents, Dolly and Samuel Taylor, and her mother's eleven siblings. In 1938 she returned to Elizabeth, New Jersey, to be with her father and was raised by her paternal grandparents, Thomas and Gertrude Turner.

Her formal education began at Elijah Boudinot School #9 and then at Winfield Scott School #2. Afterward, her middle school years were at Lafayette Jr. High School and then on to Battin High School, where she graduated in 1948. Upon graduation from high school, she began night classes at New York University, studying musical conducting while working during the day. Ultimately, she left her studies to become employed full-time at Schering Plough Corporation in the Quality Control Testing Laboratories.

Leola began studying piano in 1940. In 1948, as she became a more accomplished musician, she began her classical training with Professor Albert Tillery of Newark, NJ. Battin High School also nurtured Leola's musical talents as a pianist and xylophonist. However Union Baptist Church was her spiritual and musical home for the arc of her life.

Leola was baptized at Union Baptist Church in 1939, where her grandmother, Gertrude Turner, was an active member and head of the committee which purchased the Hammond organ, which still sits in the sanctuary of Union Baptist Church today. Leola began formerly playing the organ and piano at Union at the young age of twelve.

Leola was formerly married to Gordon Scott, Sr., also of Elizabeth, and from that union, two sons were born, Gordon and Darryl, who were the pride and joy of her life. While raising her sons, Leola worked at Levy Brothers Department Store, first in the gloves department and then as the store's accounting cashier from 1970 until 1974. In 1974 she left Levy Brothers to join the Elizabethtown Gas Company where she worked in the accounting department until her retirement in 1995.

During her eighty plus years as a Union Baptist Church member, Leola participated in various ministries and fellowships, such as the Intermediate Choir, Junior Usher Board, youth news bulletin, The Union Baptist Scroll, Sunday school participant and teacher, various committees, and even as Women Day Chairperson. Many will remember Sister Scott's generosity in volunteering her time and talent, offering piano lessons to Union members, culminating in musical recitals. We will miss her love of and commitment to the Senior Choir, the Combined Choir, and Handbell Choir, along with her regular presence at Bible Study and her humble service as a Deaconess at Union Baptist Church.

Leola was also a fierce and determined woman in every part of her life. Her love of life, her children, community, church, and being with others brought her profound joy that you saw in her smile, heard in her laughter, and experienced in her random and intentional acts of kindness. Guided by her deep sense of social justice and fairness, Leola was also very engaged in her local community. She was a regular member of her community group, acting as recording secretary, meeting with local politicians and law enforcement to encourage community development and safety. She actively supported education initiatives and local school reforms and participated in any endeavor that improved children's circumstances. Influencend by her admiration of her former pastor of Union Baptist Church, A. Alexander Lewis, and Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., through both her church and community, Leola became involved in the civil rights movement activities in the 1950s and '60s and throughout her daily life as a citizen and person of faith.

Deaconess Scott is predeceased by her parents, her brother, Michael, who died during infancy and numerous other relatives and dear friends she cared for in sickness. She leaves to celebrate her life and cherish her memory, her devoted and loving sons Gordon and Darryl, other cherished family members, dear, faithful, and lifelong friends, colleagues and coworkers, along with her Elizabeth community and the members and associates of her beloved Union Baptist Church. Leola was a lovely lady, a wise woman who had a generous heart, a beautiful smile, with a wickedly fun sense of humor. Remember her with joy and laughter!
