

Obituary

He was a hard worker and his commitment to family unity was evident in his ability to keep everyone together.

Alfred graduated from Harran High School and then proceeded on his journey to work at St. Luke's Hospital where he became a short-order cook. Alfred worked faithfully, walking up the hospital hill everyday for 37 years. It was during his years of working at St. Luke's Hospital that he met his wife, Alice Williams in 1956. The two of them fell in love and were joined in marriage 1963, fulfilling the longevity of 57 years of marriage. It was during this union of longevity that Alfred and his lovely wife birthed and raised four daughters, of which two were twins. Alfred always taught his daughters to stick together like the three musketeers, all for one and one for all. His phrase is repeated until this day by his daughters as a memorable principle that became a reality.

He also enjoyed making spaghetti for the Harding Village Community during his visits to North Carolina. His legacy of displaying hospitality to family and friends during holidays and making sure everyone had food to eat will not be forgotten.
