<u>Obituary</u>

Beverly Olivia was born to Aubrey and Olivia Black on January 22, 1944 in the Republic of Panama. Beverly attended Canal Zone schools in the township of Rainbow City, Canal Zone. As a junior in high school, Beverly emigrated to Brooklyn, New York to live with her Aunt Ivy and Uncle Sito. In later years, she dedicated her Friday evenings to spending time with both aunt and uncle. She thoroughly enjoyed those visits.

Upon her arrival, Beverly enrolled, attended and graduated from Franklin K. Lane High School in Brooklyn, New York. It was during this time that she was introduced to Tomás A. Berrio through her classmate and her future sister-in-law. It wasn't until a few years later that they began a courtship and in 1966, they were joined in Holy Matrimony. They made their home in East Elmhurst, Queens. To their union were born two beautiful and loving daughters, Ivette and Michelle. Beverly was a devout Catholic and attended Mass with her family at St. Mary's Catholic Church in Flushing, Queens.

As the girls grew, Beverly and girls traveled abroad as well as toured cities and states across the nation. Beverly was adventurous and a fun loving mother. She exposed her daughters to different cultures and took them on excursions exploring marine life, enjoying beaches and parks. They traveled both to California and Virginia to spend time with her mother, sisters and brother-in-law. Beverly was energetic and full of life. Dancing was her passion and she moved to the rhythm of any salsa, merengue, calypso, reggae and soul music.

Beverly earned a Bachelor of Science degree in Nutrition and Dietetics from Pratt Institute in New York City. She received her license as a Dietician by New York Institute of Dietetics, granted by the State of New York. In that capacity, Beverly obtained employment as a Dietician with Fairview Nursing Home in Forest Hill, NY, for twenty-one years. Additionally, she pursued a post doctorate course in lactation management of the breast feeding mother. This allowed her gainful employment with Woodhall Hospital in Brooklyn, New York in the capacity as a Nutritionist, specializing in the Woman, Infant and Children (WIC) Program. She was employed for 7 years when she became ill.

To her family's dismay, Beverly contracted a viral infection at work. Her lengthy hospitalization was further complicated with a persistent and high grade fever. This life threatening condition resulted in cognitive impairment for which she required extensive therapy, continuous medical treatment and daily assisted care. She received medical treatments both in Boston, Massachusetts as well as New York City. Ivette and Michelle visited often and followed through in every aspect of her care. During her illness, her daughters and granddaughter would pick her up from the rehabilitation facility to spend major holidays with her family. These were special moments where Beverly would rave about the meals they prepared. She enjoyed those occasions immensely! At other times, they would take her for short walks along the beach front.

Following twenty-six years of illness, on March 21, 2021, God in His infinite wisdom saw fit to call her home. Her journey on this earth was not in vain. Her life will be forever cherished and she will never be forgotten.

Beverly leaves to cherish her memory: two loving daughters, Ivette Berrio and Michelle Berrio; two grandchildren, Jasmine Irizarry and Jacob Brown; two great granddaughters, Mia Uruchima and Olivia Short-Irizarry; three sisters, Violeta (Edward) Wooten, Veronica McMath and Yolanda Lewis; nieces and nephews; and a host of cousins and lifelong friends.
