## <u>Obituary</u>

Thomasena "Aunt Tom Tom" Alexander (née Wilson), 91 departed this life peacefully at St. Joseph's Wayne Hospital in Wayne on Thursday May 20th, 2021.

Born in Bishopville, South Carolina to the late Samuel Thomas and Emma Alexander, she was adopted as a baby by Carrie Wilson. Thomasena lived in Bishopville until her sister Katie sent for her to move to Baltimore, Maryland when she was a teenager. She later moved to Paterson, NJ to find a job in the industrial city known for its silk factories.

Ms. Alexander was a resident of Paterson for 79 years. She lived at 38 Plum Street for 33 years where she was a founder of the first unofficial neighborhood watch. Affectionately called 'Tommie', "Big Beef', 'Tommie Cat' and "Tom C" by friends, the nickname, "Aunt Tom Tom" is the one she loved the most. Thomasena worked as a laundress at Topps Cleaners in Hackensack, NJ. She later became a machine operator at Marcel Paper Mill in Elmwood Park, NJ before retiring in 1996.

In the 1940s, Thomasena spent many nights swing dancing at the famed Savoy Ballroom in Harlem. Her kicks, spins and drops made her a regular in the swing dance community. She was a griot who loved telling stories about her life growing up in the Jim Crow south and the lives of her and her friends after they migrated up north. Thomasena was an avid collector who saved hundreds of obituaries of loved ones, friends and people from the community. She kept a journal where logged her daily thoughts, prayers, lottery results and the coming and goings of her children and grandchildren. Her summer days were spent sitting on the porch waving at passersby, giving some life advice or offering a cold beverage. Aunt Tom Tom was the Oueen of the Atlantic City Bus rides and always danced in the aisle to her favorites, James Brown and Ray Charles. She loved attending special events at the National Action Network and listened to Rev. Dr. Al Sharpton daily radio show regularly. Her favorite quotes/sayings were, "Talk to me if you can" when she wanted to confirm how she was feeling or what she was saying. "You don't wanna mess with me!', to let people know she had two godsons in law enforcement. Or "I love you and there's nothing you can do about it' as confirmation of her unconditional love.

She was preceded in death by her parents and two sisters, Katie Statham Brown and Geneva Wilson Overstreet.

Surviving are her daughter, Valerie Wilson of Paterson; son, Aaron "Tojo" (Marlene) Wilson of Woodland Park; grandchildren, Aisha "Holly" Wilson of Teaneck, Travoy (Jennifer) Wilson of Warner Robins, G.A.; Emmiah Wilson, Ashanti Wilson and Janquelle Melton all of Woodland Park; nieces, Ernestine Hunter, Carrie (Jack) Wortham both of Baltimore, M.D.; and special niece, Thomasina Statham of Harlem, N.Y.; goddaughters Sheena Freeland and Delores Freeland both of Paterson, godsons, Thomas Conyers of Paterson and John (Kimeko) Jones of Wayne; #1 nieces, Janet Jones Josephine Jones, Delores Freeland and Sheena Freeland; and special nephews, Hector "Man" Hernandez Jr, Larry"Ree Ree" Hayward Jr. and Iziah "Scooter" Jones.
