Margaret Jane DaCosta Holt was born in New York City on July 6, 1930, to Jose DaCosta and Ethel Moore. Raised in the South Bronx with her 10 siblings, she grew up on 170th street and attended Elementary School P.S. 23, Junior High School P.S. 40, and James Monroe High School.

Margaret was a fun-loving child who loved to laugh, dance, and had a silly side. She enjoyed playing tennis in school, swimming, and spending time with her mom. She unfortunately lost her mother at the tender age of 10, which impacted her greatly. She was supported by her father and older siblings at that time.

In 1946, Margaret met her beloved husband Oscar Holt Jr. They were married on July 20, 1947, when Margaret was 17 years old. They were married for 27 years and had 7 beautiful children. They raised their family in the Bronx River Projects, building 1575. In 1972 they moved their family to the Parkchester section of the Bronx. Sadly, her husband passed away shortly after in 1974. Left to continue to raise her four youngest children by herself, she started working in the Parkchester Laundromat. In 1975, she earned her GED.

While Margaret always had a love and reverence for the Lord, it wasn't until she was introduced to the teaching ministry of Dr. Fredrick K.C. Price, a Pastor from California, that her faith really began to grow. She started watching his television service in 1978 and shared it with her family. She gave her life to Jesus at one of Dr. Price's crusades in New Brunswick, New Jersey. When Dr. Price established Crenshaw Christian Center East in New York City, Margaret became a member and began serving in the nursery doing what she loved best, teaching children.

In 1980, Margaret started taking courses at Queens College through the Adult College Education Program. In 1984, she graduated with a Bachelor of Science degree in Health Management. Shortly after, she attended a job fair looking for work in the health field. However, she was recruited to become a teacher. Margaret began her teaching career in 1985 at C.S 150 in the South Bronx. While teaching she began taking courses at Lehman College and in 1989, she obtained her Master's Degree in Elementary Education. She accomplished all of this while getting her youngest child through high school and starting college.

Margaret was loved by her students and school community. Many parents pushed for their children to be in her class. She was known to receive accolades for having the best class performances in the school. Her illustrious career spanned 15 years until she retired in the year 2000. After retirement, Margaret still had a desire to teach and be with children. She began working as a substitute teacher and got a recurring assignment at P.S. 106 in Parkchester for several years.

Margaret also began immersing herself in her father's Brazilian culture. He was born in Brazil and emigrated to the United States as a young man. She was fortunate enough to visit her father's hometown of Maranhão in 1996. In honor of her Brazilian heritage, Margaret would attend the yearly Brazilian Day Parade in New York City. She loved and learned to make the popular Brazilian dish, feijoada. Margaret also loved the ballet and was a season ticket holder of the New York City Ballet.

Margaret loved her family and was proud of them. She leaves to cherish her memory her seven children, Althea Donnelley, Oscar Holt III, Mina Holt-Andrews, Steven Holt, Ethel Smiley, Brian Holt, and Kimberly Holt, 17 grandchildren, 19 great grandchildren and 1 great-great granddaughter, CeeCee. She also leaves behind her two sisters Ethel DaCosta-Archer and Lolita DaCosta, as well as a host of nieces and nephews, other relatives, loved ones and beloved friends.
