In Scotland County, North Carolina, on the 2nd day of July 1929, Frank and Emmaline McLaurin welcomed their second child, **Lougertha McLaurin**, into their family. Lougertha was named after her maternal grandmother (Mystery solved). The family relocated to New York when she was very young. At the age of 7, Lougertha along with her siblings moved to North Carolina and grew up in the care of their paternal grandparents, James and Sally McLaurin. Lougertha (aka Lou or Gert) received her education through the Scotland County North Carolina School System.

One day while riding the bus to high school, the beautiful Lougertha captured the heart of Rudolph J. Douglas (aka Rudy). He told everyone she was his girl and she said, "No I am not!". Eventually she said, "Yes, I will be your girlfriend". He became the love of her life. Rudolph completed his military service and was Honorably Discharged from the United States Army in 1947. The lovebirds resumed their courtship and were married in January 1950. The coupled relocated to Queens, New York and joined Carter Community A.M.E. Church under the pastorate of Reverend Julius C. Carter, its founder. Lougertha was a very active member serving on the Usher Board, and the North Carolina Club. In addition, Lougertha was a faithful member of the Back to God Hour Evening Choir, which was organized by Rev. Edith Randolph. The Choir often traveled with Rev. Randolph when she preached at local Churches in the Jamaica, New York area.

Lougertha was a wonderful wife and mother. She maintained a beautiful home and took excellent care of her husband and children. As parents Rudolph and Lougertha agreed on the importance of education for their children. Their mantra: "You either go to college or get a real good job (Civil Service)." You had to do something with your life. - That was their charge to everyone whose lives they touched. (Lougertha was very proud of her children. They all graduated from High School and continued their education through the world of work and/or academia.)

Lougertha was very family oriented. She really enjoyed her home being the gathering place for extended family and friends. On Thanksgiving, one of her favorite holidays, relatives would come from North Carolina, Texas, Georgia, and various areas of New York to Aunt Gert and Uncle Rudy's for the annual dinner. Mrs. Douglas was an excellent cook! She was most famous for her potato salad and sweet potato pies. She welcomed everyone with open arms and a great smile. "Gert" had a no-nonsense approach to life and her favorite sayings were: "Steady in the boat.", "You know what I mean!", "Don't do me like that!" and "Every pot has its lid.".

Mrs. Douglas, a God-fearing woman, walked faithfully by her husband's side with love, support and encouragement as he accepted his call to the Ministry. In 1969 Rev. and Mrs. Douglas received their first pastoral appointment to St. Peter's A.M.E. Church in Douglaston. Their traveling choir, which was comprised of their children, extended family and friends, accompanied them. In 1973, Mrs. Douglas served as First Lady at Bethel A.M.E. Church in Babylon; a year later at Mount Olive A.M.E. Church in Port Washington. Everywhere they went they always had an entourage of youth and supporters. Rev. & Mrs. Rudolph & Lougertha Douglas and Family were home when he was appointed to Bethel A.M.E. Church in Westbury, New York, by the Right Reverend Richard Allen Hildebrand. By the grace of God Rev. & Mrs. Douglas served the Bethel Church Family for 27 years. Mrs. Lougertha Douglas was an excellent First Lady. She was humble, hands-on, loving, warm and caring. She loved her "Bethel People" and was always willing to help when and where she could. Sis. Douglas was not a stranger in the Bethel kitchen, especially when it came to cleaning the coffee pot. The coffee would taste so good after she cleaned it.

As First Lady Sis. Douglas served as Advisor of the Anna Payne Thompson Women's Missionary Society and the Young People's Division. Sis. Douglas also served as Treasurer of the Ministers' Wives and Spouses Organization of the New York Conference. She was a member of the New York Conference Women's Missionary Society Credentials Committee. Sis. Douglas loved the youth and young adults and families. She would always share her wisdom as she advised, encouraged, and supported them concerning education, life lessons and their relationship with Jesus and Bethel A.M.E. Church.

Lougertha lived life to the fullest enjoying dancing, traveling, shopping, spending time with her family, extended family, and friends. She always smiled and laughed when she saw her grandchildren and great-grandchildren running around and having fun. She loved all types of music especially gospel music and good preaching. One would often hear her very identifiable exclamations of "AMEN!", "HALLELUJAH!" and "THANK YOU JESUS!". She enjoyed the youth programs of liturgical dance, theatre and stepping. To honor her and her love for gospel music one of the Bethel A.M.E. Church choirs was renamed The Lougertha Ensemble.

Mrs. Lougertha Douglas was an elegantly dressed First Lady. She loved hats and all her outfits were expertly styled by her. The dress or suit, hat, shoes, purse, gloves, and accessories were perfectly matched and appropriate for the season. She was beautiful inside and out. Mrs. Lougertha Douglas exemplified a LADY of wisdom, knowledge, grace, and strength!


