Walks in botanical garden were a joy to her. Any plant she saw she could tell you what it was just by the leaf. Although being raised in the country, Ruby always dreamed of living in the big city... New York City!

When Ruby became a young adult, she and her 2 sisters Tessie and Mamie ventured to New York City for a better living. It was in 1945, where she met the love of her life and soulmate Berion Lee McDonald. They met at a mutual friend's house who used to play his jukebox and all who came by could dance all night. Well, Ruby and Berion eyes met and they danced all night. By 1947, they were married and soon had 6 children (3 boys and 3 girls). She was now on to a new path of motherhood.

Ruby stayed in the church. She understood the reverence of God. She gave her life to Christ at Greater Refuge Temple shortly after marriage. Soon after, Berion gave his life to Christ too. Ruby took her responsibilities as a mother to heart. It was very important for her to raise her children in the eyes of the Lord.

Ruby was a homemaker and ensured her children were well taken care of. Later when her children were old enough, she acquired a job with the Department of Education at Jane Adams High School working as a food service worker. This worked out well for her because she had all the school days off with her children.

Family was so important to Ruby and Berion that they would take the kids in that old green car and head to Rye Beach, N.Y. for their annual family trip.

Ruby deeply loved and understood the importance of family, where, if possible, she would attend the annual Spivey's family reunion in Windsor N.C. every first weekend in July.

She was an outstanding grandmother, great grandmother and great-great grandmother loving all her grands equally.

She never refused any of her grandchildren. She would always say, "I don't want to see anyone go into the system." We grands called her "Nana."

When she retired, she followed her husband back to his home in Mt. Gilead, N.C. There they served the Lord attending St Luke Church of God and continued in their ministries including prison ministry and helping others in need. When her husband of 75 years went on to the Lord in 2020, she quickly came back up to New York and stayed with her granddaughter, Tene. She longed for her husband but enjoyed life and family. Her love for God was so strong she even continued to praise and worship God in her last days. She lived 96 years.

Ruby Spivey McDonald was preceded in death by her late husband Berion Lee McDonald, daughters Pamela, and Diane. Her son Samuel and grandson Kevin.
