Anthony Morris Shaw, affectionately called Tony was the eighth of the ten children of Leleith Burgess Shaw and Gladstone Shaw. Tony was born in the Bronx, NY. His educational experience included graduation from Saint Anthony of Padua Elementary School and Morris High School in the Bronx. Upon graduation from Morris High School, Tony enlisted in the Air Force and soon after was sent to Vietnam. He received an honorable discharge and a special membership in the American Legion for outstanding service and loyalty to the United States of America. Upon his return from Vietnam, he attended Bronx Community College and City College of New York, where he received a Bachelor's Degree.

During his years at Saint Anthony's, Tony was a most outstanding altar server. Some priests would request his service because of his dedication and expertise. At this time Tony received many awards and honors for his dedication and service to the church.

Tony began his years of employment running a concession stand at Orchard Beach, often working a seven day week. Upon returning from Vietnam, Tony was employed by the N.Y.C. Housing and Preservation Development as a property manager. Then he moved on to the City of N.Y. Department of Veterans Affairs where he advocated for the rights and benefits of veterans. Afterwards, he diligently worked for the N.Y.C. Department of Parks, refurbishing Crotona Park in the Bronx. After Crotona Park was modernized, Tony was employed with Twin Parks Management Co. then on to a position with the N.Y.S. Housing Department as the head of Minority and Women's Affairs.

Afterwards, he worked for the Bovis Construction Company that was based in a trailer outside of the World Trade Center. Tony was on his way to a meeting when he saw the first plane crash into the World Trade Center Tower. He ran back to the trailer to warn his colleagues and urging them to leave immediately. Tony was caught by the dust cloud and had to walk home, but he was comforted by the fact that he saved his colleagues from the collapse of the towers. As usual, Tony moved on and did not let the 9/11 disaster define him. Later on he took a position with the Shinda Management Co., managing some of their properties.

John Shaw stated, "I couldn't have a more loving and generous brother. He always put family before himself". If you were ill or needed any type of help, Tony would be there. He was caring, generous, funny, helpful and highly motivated. When illness befelled Tony he would find a way to move past it and keep moving forward. He was helpful to everyone who knew him. Tony networked and had many connections which he shared with colleagues, friends and family. He also had a great sense of humor. One of his favorite movies was "Dr. Strangelove or How I Learned to Stop Worrying and Love the Bomb."

Preceding him in death were: his parents; three brothers, Douglas Leon, Gladstone Shaw, Jr. and Arthur Shaw; his sister, Phyllis Shaw; and longtime friend, James Ling. He is survived by: two sisters, Mary Arlene Williams and Hyacinth Brea; and three brothers, Franklin Shaw, John Shaw and Raymond Shaw. Additionally, he is survived by Sue Ann Ling, Unika Canton and her children, Star, Deshawn, Tyshawn and Kayshawn.

Also left behind to cherish his memory are four generations of family members including at least twelve nieces and nephews, a host of cousins and other relatives and longtime friend, Leo Almonte. Tony was also grateful for his many friends and neighbors at this last residence, who embellished his life with their love, caring, thoughtful words and deeds. His family extends heartfelt thanks to all of you.
