Kenny attended PS #30 Elementary School in Jersey City, NJ and graduated from St. Benedict's Prep High School in Newark, NJ. He attended two years of college and had an interest in aeronautics. He then worked at the Post Office as a Safety Captain for about a decade.

In 1985, Kenny married Rochelle Best. They purchased a house in East Orange, NJ and had two children from this union: Jamilia and Jelani Best. Throughout his life, Kenny was known as a conversationalist. He loved to laugh and enjoyed striking up conversation and meeting new people. He had a revolutionary mindset and wanted to create an investment program so that black people could generate wealth and improve the community.

His journey through life was marked by deep compassion, selflessness, and an enduring commitment to family and social issues. In March 1993 at the age of 33, Kenny was involved in a severe car accident which led to an undiagnosed traumatic brain injury. This would change the trajectory of his life because it impacted his ability to fulfill his dreams, but it never stopped his positive light from shining through.

Kenny did the best that he could to support his family. After his marriage ended, he moved back to Jersey City with his mother, Mary Jane. They had a very special bond and were the best of friends. He met Michele Moreland in 1996, and through that relationship he had Lorenzo "LJ" Best and helped raise Jazmeeka Moreland as his own daughter. Kenny loved his children and took immense pride in their accomplishments, joys, and milestones. His passions included writing poetry, listening to music, taking long drives, and engaging in interesting conversations.

Kenny was raised with a deep sense of compassion and empathy, which manifested in his desire to make the world a better place for all. He touched the lives of many people through his acts of kindness and generosity. Kenny was a passionate and devoted son, father, and grandfather who faced life's challenges with a smile, resilience, and unwavering positivity. Kenny will continue to live on through his children: Jamilia Best, Jelani Best, Jazmeeka Moreland, Lorenzo "LJ" Best and daughter-in-law Stefanie Best. He also leaves behind his cherished grandchildren: Layla Smith, Jasiah Best and Olivia Best.
