Vienna Michaeline (Coqueran) Medford was born on May 6, 1925, to Marcel Etienne and Racina Valantine Coqueran in San Fernando, Trinidad. In 1947, she married Rudolph Martin Medford, who passed away on April 6, 2014. From this union, they had eight children together. Vienna migrated to the United States in November 1969 to provide her children with better opportunities. She was a devoted mother who never failed to correct them when needed, regardless of their age. She loved her family, her grandchildren, great grandchildren and great-great grandchild.

She was a woman of great strength and courage, as she maneuvered all her challenges in life. In her early years, she began as a student monitor at St. Gabriel Roman Catholic School. After a negative experience with a nun, she did not want to go back. So, her aunt introduced her to sewing, where she found her passion. She had a natural gift for sewing without patterns. Hence she became a seamstress. She had lots of clients in Trinidad, including a government minister's wife and her entire family.

Upon moving to the U.S., she worked for the Henkoff family, who had two children (Lisa and Phillip) whom she took care of. The Henkoff family sponsored her which greatly impacted her life. Vienna became the head seamstress at Halloran House, which later became Marriott.

Mommy (the name she was called by all) loved dancing, traveling both domestically and internationally. She traveled to a lot of places, including Africa, Rome, Lourdes, Fatima and Medjugorje and other religious sites. Mommy also enjoyed whistling while sewed.

She was a devout Catholic and attended mass seven days a week at Sacred Heart Church. Her rosary was always in her hand, so much so she passed away with two rosaries around her neck. She said her rosary was her comforter. As her memory declined, she never forgot how to say the rosary, even at the end, she mumbled it.

In the last couple of days, she was unable to raise herself up without assistance. This would be the last memorable and recent thing Mommy did, was to sit up with haste much to our amazement – when we told her Father Delva was here to see her. Our mom will be remembered as a kind and caring person.

As stated before, she loved to travel. She will now take flight on Delta Airlines to Highland Memorial Cemetery in Orlando, Florida, to her final resting place alongside her daughter Marcia. May the choirs of angels come to greet her and may they speed her to paradise.
